Objectives:

- ♣ To share innovative practices followed in the respective institutions with the academic fraternity.
- **♣** To stimulate an academic environment for promotion of quality in teaching, learning and evaluation.
- ♣ To collaborate with stakeholders of higher education for quality promotion and sustenance
- ♣ To encourage professionals and institutions to undertake quality related research.
- ♣ To deliberate on issues and challenges in assimilating ICT in inclusive practices.

Conference Strands:

1. Redesigning the learning landscape.

There is a need for a fresh conceptualization of education in areas of instructional approaches and curriculum. The present education needs to engage students in relevant knowledge construction and focus on student centered learning which leads to in depth mastery of content. This strand explores the innovative instructional methods, which facilitate effective learning leading to desired learning outcomes.

2. Mechanisms for student assessment and feedback.

The prevalent assessment practices force students to prepare only from the examination point of view, which eventually stifles deep learning and throttles creative thinking. Thus to improve student learning, educationists need to seriously look into innovative assessment practices which aligns itself with the new constructivist approach. The new challenge before educationists is to discard the conception of 'one size fits all' and work on alternatives to the psychologically unsound practices/ traditional methods. This section examines not only the innovative approaches to student assessment and feedback, but also the impact of these novel practices on future learning.

3. Collaborations and Capacity building of workforce and stakeholders.

Collaborations or team work entails each person to take on a more integrated partnering role, to create a better work environment. High performing institutions are a result of such intra and inter institutional collaborations, which eventually benefits all. The issue of education and industry interface is the new dimension which needs attention to bridge the existing skill gap. This segment seeks innovative ideas or experiences on initiatives taken towards collaboration. We also welcome papers on measures taken to enhance capacities of staff and students.

4. Integrating digital technologies to promote inclusive practices.

The new age learner profile is constantly changing. Today's classrooms are a heterogeneous mix of students with various learning difficulties and challenges. The current scenario expects teachers to align their teaching - learning to meet this change in learner demography. In recognition of the potential contribution of digital technologies to education, papers are invited on how ICT can be harnessed in teaching-learning, to support the diverse learner needs thereby making education truly inclusive.

Call for Paper

This conference invites all academicians, teacher educators, research scholars, experts and NGOs to present conceptual or research based papers as per the strands of the conference. Papers on related areas of the strands are also welcome. Paper presentation can either be oral (5 -7 min) or as live demonstration of successful innovative practices implemented in the respective institution in the form of role plays, dramatization, simulations or video recordings of the practices (10 -12 min).
