Concept Note

The constitutional and legal nomenclature that India has adopted for the tribals is scheduled tribes, referring to the schedule in which communities and identities are categorised. As per the census of 2011, persons belonging to the scheduled tribes amount to 8.6% of the total population of the country. Across the length and breadth of India, there is an array of names which designate the tribes. Names such as adivasis, autochthonous peoples, indigenous communities, and vanvasis are a few of these names with their own loaded meanings and ideological moorings.

Extensive studies by pioneering social scientists have produced a corpus of literature of tribals in India highlighting the diversity within and between the different tribal communities. Scholars have delved deep into the interface between the ideal types of 'caste' and 'tribe' and documented the divergences and inter-linkages. Inter-tribal relations marked by collaboration and conflict, differences along geographical lines along with ethnic assertion, the political economy of the tribal life world and political mobilization of tribal communities have also been studied in detail. The encounter between major world religions and the tribal religions on the one hand and the fascinating flourish of tribal movements on religious and sectarian lines have also been documented a great deal. The state, civil society and tribes is another area of research which traces the different shades of inter-relationship between these domains and agents.

In the backdrop of these studies, the present seminar aims to bring together academicians and researchers from across India to probe further the contemporary dynamics of the tribal life-world in India. Prominent concern is the way the state is seen to be involving in the tribal areas as a facilitating agent for the unbridled play of neo-liberal economics. This is entwined with the dominant models of development in India today with their multifaceted impact on tribal society. An area of research connected to this is the magnitude of tribal out migration. At the same time, the tribal regions of India are today abuzz with localized movements with dynamic leadership raising a whole series of important issues with the state and the civil society at large. While the processes associated with globalization have in some ways resulted in development induced displacement and other allied difficulties for the tribals, globalization has also provided the possibility of building

up the synergy of tribal activism across nations and continents.

The seminar will also have a focus on the tribal communities of Maharashtra. The tribal scene in the state of Maharashtra is a diverse one in terms of geography, ethnicity and identity. The papers in the seminar would bring under one platform the fruits of contemporary research on the tribal situation in Maharashtra.

Objectives of the Seminar

- To assess the influence of the processes of globalization on the tribal communities in India, with particular reference to their impact on livelihood, identities and rights.
- To critically analyse the different shades of the relationship between the state, the civil society and tribals
- To understand the tenacity of the various social movements among the tribal communities.

This seminar invites papers that examine the following sub-themes:

- State, civil society and tribes: issues and policies
- Tribal communities, culture and issues of identities
- Development and globalisation: displacement, rehabilitation and tribal exclusion and inclusion
- Tribal social movements
- Intersection of gender, caste, class and tribe
- Discourse on rights to land, resources and livelihoods
