 - (a) An educational institution is not simply a splendid building with furnished classrooms, spacious halls, well-equipped libraries and laboratories, and large playgrounds; rather, it is a 'learning-environment', which is organized by teachers for promoting all-round development of learners. In creating a learning environment, the role of teachers is of paramount importance. Learning takes place under certain conditions, which can be created only by competent and imaginative teachers. The sum total of learning conditions created by teachers makes a healthy learning environment. Education Commission (1964-66) rightly remarked that of all the different factors, which influenced the quality of education and its contribution to national development, the quality, competence and character of teachers were undoubtedly the most significant. Nothing was more important than securing a sufficient supply of high quality recruits to the teaching profession, providing them with the best possible professional preparation, and creating

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satisfactory conditions of work in which they could be fully effective. Attempts should be made to feed back a significant proportion of talented youth from our schools and colleges into the education system as teachers. For this purpose it is necessary to make an intensive and continuous effort to raise the economic social and professional status of teachers in order to attract young men and women of ability to the profession and to retain them in it as dedicated, enthusiastic and contented workers.

(b) When I come out of the kitchen, the verandah is empty. The plantain leaves have been removed and the place cleared of the remains of the meal. Fledgelings would now seek my approval and I could cut them down with the merest lift of an eyebrow.

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
